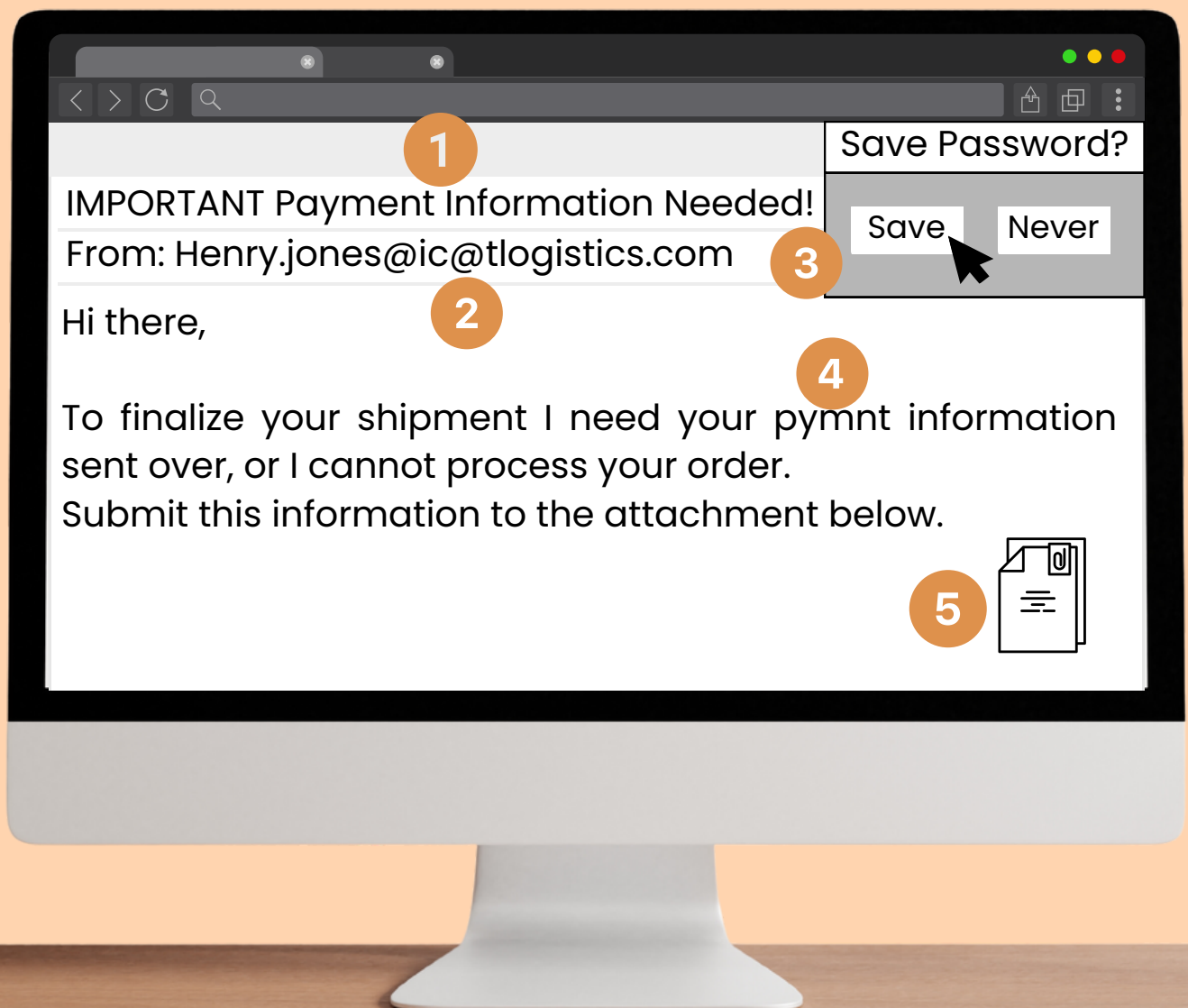


# Answer Key.

Legitimate companies don't request your sensitive information via email. Most companies won't ask you to send your passwords, credit card information, credit scores, or tax numbers.

In scam/fraud emails, the sending email address will typically try to mimic a real email address by slightly altering the name.

You shouldn't save your password to your computer or write it down anywhere someone can easily access it. You should also never use a password that a scammer/hacker could easily guess.

In scam/fraud emails, there will often be one or two words spelled incorrectly and/or bad grammar. A email from a legitimate organization should be well written.

5

Unsolicited emails that contain attachments are a giveaway of a hacker. Typically, authentic organizations don't randomly send you emails with attachments.
